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HBU'S BIBLE MUSEUM TURNS 25!

As Houston Baptist University's Dunham Bible Museum turns 25 this year, we are thankful to Dr. Jerry Wiles for recounting the story of how the Museum came to be at HBU.

In 1992, Wiles, then serving as assistant vice president for church relations at HBU, arranged a meeting to introduce HBU president Dr. Doug Hodo to Jonathan Byrd in Indianapolis, Indiana. Byrd owned the largest collection of rare American Bibles in existence in private hands. This was one of four major collections Byrd had put together over a period of more than 30 years. The only larger collection in the country at that time was in the American Bible Society's library and archives in New York City.

Dr. Craig Lampe, scholar, business partner and curator of the Byrd collection, gave Dr. Hodo a presentation of some items in the collection. Dr. Hodo immediately recognized the historical and educational value of the rare Bibles, theological books, and biblical artifacts in the collection.

About 1995, Byrd decided to make the American collection available to an institution or organization that would create a museum of Bibles and biblical artifacts. After Byrd had the collection appraised and placed on the market, a major ministry based in Colorado Springs initiated plans to purchase the collection and establish the museum on its campus. Andy Stimer, a long-time friend and advisor to Jonathan Byrd, was instrumental in casting the vision and designing the plan to establish the Bible Museum. However, as a result of some changes within the Colorado ministry which was planning to purchase and create the Bible museum, plans for the Colorado museum project were discontinued.

In the latter part of 1996, when he was then serving with a global mission organization in Colorado Springs, Jerry Wiles met Andy Stimer. In January of 1997, after Wiles returned to his former position with HBU as assistant vice president for church relations, Stimer made a trip to Houston, visited HBU, and presented Dr. Hodo with the idea of HBU acquiring the American Bible collection and establishing a museum on

the campus. Hodo, having been aware of the collection since his first meeting with Byrd and Lampe in 1992, immediately got excited about the possibility. He arranged a meeting with Stewart Morris for Stimer to present the idea of the museum project. At Morris' suggestion, the idea was presented to other board members, and later to members of the faculty and staff.

Over a period of several months, HBU learned about and connected with a number of Bible collectors, scholars, antiquarian societies and other organizations who became great resources for research and collaboration.

In the early Spring of 1997, Jonathan Byrd and Craig Lampe came to Houston to make presentations to HBU board members and spend time with some university faculty and staff. After considerable research, vetting, and having the collection appraised again, the board voted to make the purchase. The process of creating what was then known as the Bible in America Museum began. The late Bruce Belin,

businessman and HBU board member, played a key role in negotiating and facilitating the transaction. During that season, Doug and Sadie Hodo and Jerry Wiles made another trip to Indianapolis to further examine the collection.

Over the next few years a number of trips were made to collaborate with American Bible Society staff and scholars in New York, as well as other Bible collectors, antiquarians and scholars around the country. Dr. Gene Habecker, then president of the American Bible Society (ABS), and some of their staff visited the campus to see the collection and learn more about the university's plans. As a result of those interactions, the leadership of ABS made the decision to create a gallery in New York to display some of their rare books, Bibles and artifacts to be accessible to the public.

Initially, HBU displayed the Bible collection in the Library Lecture room in the Moody Library – what is now Java City. In those early days, many tours and presentations were made, along with continuing research. The interest continued to grow as the vision and mission for the museum was shared on campus as well as in churches and other venues in the region. A good number of out-of-town guests were able to visit the museum. Some of those included gala speakers like General Norman Schwarzkopf and former British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher. Many other prominent scholars and leaders came to tour the museum and learn about the project.

In the Fall of 2002, a major inaugural event, which was open to the public, was hosted at a large conference center in Houston. The program featured Jeanette Cliff George, former State Senator Mike Richards, as well as prominent church and city leaders.

There were many twists and turns and challenges in those early years. Some of those included the invasion and potential mold damage of the collection, learning about and construction of a climate control system, as well as security issues. It was encouraging and amazing to see the hand of God intervening and overseeing all obstacles.

In 2003, Dr. Diana Severance began working as a volunteer with the museum, and became the curator in the

Spring of 2003, when Wiles left the university to assume the presidency of Living Water International.

As plans began to be made for construction of the Cultural Arts Center, Dr. Hodo repeatedly stated that the Bible Museum was to be the "Crown Jewel" of the Cultural Arts Center. Conoco Phillips gave a gift of \$1,000,000 designated for the construction of the Bible Museum's new home. The gift was given by the Board of Directors of ConocoPhillips in recognition of Archie Dunham's leadership as Chairman of the Company. The Museum's name was then changed to The Dunham Family Bible in America Museum.

The Bible Museum would begin a new life with the move to the Cultural Arts Center in 2008. ... This story to be continued!

A FILM CREW COMES TO HBU

In January a film crew from D. James Kennedy Ministries visited HBU to film portions of the newly released video Who Is This Jesus? Is He The Only Way?


The film crew interviewed Drs. Craig Evans, Mike Licona, Nancy Pearcey, and Diana Severance while also filming extensively from the Bible Museum's collection.

The documentary answers the question Jesus asked the disciples in Matthew 16:15, "Who do you say that I am?" In answering this question, the video considers numerous subsidiary questions: Are the Bible's accounts of the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ reliable? Does the Bible record history or myth? Did Jesus really rise from the dead as his followers claimed, or is this a story Jesus' followers fabricated? Is the Jesus of the Bible the Jesus of history?

Answering these questions and more, the documentary aims to have viewers "discover the true Jesus who lived in history, died on the cross, rose from the dead, bodily walked out of the

tomb, and calls out to all people everywhere, 'I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me."

While at HBU, filming was also done for another documentary to be released before Christmas entitled What if Jesus Had Never Been Born? This



video will examine not only Jesus's atoning death for sin, but how he has shaped many areas of life, including law, medicine, the arts, economics, education, and morality.
